Camilla Riley from the Oklahoma Alzheimer's Association will be our guest speaker at the November 12th OCREA Meeting. The topic will be alzheimer's R association

"10 Warning Signs of Alzheimer's." Currently, more than 67,000 Oklahomans are living with Alzheimer's disease, and over 129,000 family and friends are providing care. The Oklahoma Chapter provides support, education and training to increase knowledge and support to those facing Alzheimer's disease and other dementias.

Lezley Bell will demonstrate the CaptionCall phone system. She will have the system set up before the

meeting so join us for coffee and see how the system works. CaptionCall phones

are designed for individuals with hearing loss. The unit uses voice-to-text technology to transcribe your conversation so that other speakers' words appear on your CaptionCall screen. CaptionCall is federally funded as part of Title IV of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), so there's no cost for qualifying individuals. CaptionCall has a mobile app for iPhone, iPad and Android. It allows you to make and receive phone calls with captions on your Apple or Android device.





We will also award scholarships to college education majors who are preparing to complete their student teaching.

- Oklahoma's first Friends for Folks inmate dog training program began in 1990 at the men's prison in Lexington. Its success was documented in the film "The Dogs of Lexington."
- A second program was opened in January 2014 at Mabel Bassett women's prison in McLoud, OK. A second film, "Bassett Tales," premiered on OETA on July 30, 2015.
- Both films are available for viewing on YouTube.
- Sister Pauline Quinn is the inspirational figure credited for starting the first prison dog training program in the United States. In 1981, she founded the "Prison Pet Partnership Program" at the Washington State Correctional Center for Women. This program has been a model for the rehabilitation of offenders throughout the nation, including the Friends for Folks program in Oklahoma.
